Dr. Kenneth M. Reardon worked as a community organizer for the New Jersey Federation of Senior Citizens, the Connecticut Citizens Action Group and the New York Citizens Alliance after receiving his bachelor of arts degree in sociology from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst in 1976. He earned a master's degree in urban planning from Hunter College of the City University of New York in 1982 and his Ph.D. in city and regional planning from Cornell University in 1990. While serving as assistant and subsequently associate professor in urban and regional planning at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Ken established the East St. Louis Action Research Project, which provides community-based research, technical assistance, leadership training and staff support to community-based organizations and local government agencies involved in revitalization efforts. He is currently an associate professor in the Department of City and Regional Planning at Cornell University.
