What classes do we offer?

OLLI at UC offers close to 300 classes which are taken by over 1500 members each year. This quarter there are more than 100 classes. Most classes meet for 90 minutes weekly over an eight-week period. As an OLLI member you can choose from a wide assortment of lectures, seminars, field trips and special events.

Who are our teachers?

Many of our moderators are distinguished professors, both active and retired. Other teachers are experts in a variety of fields and include members who want to share their personal passion for a particular subject. There is one common denominator: they teach for the sheer love of teaching.

What are requirements to join?

Everyone age fifty and above can join. *The only prerequisite is a desire to learn.*

What does it cost?

For a single \$85 payment each quarter, you can take as many classes as you like during that quarter. Most people sign up for three courses. That's roughly \$3 an hour – about the price of a cup of coffee at Starbucks. *(If you cannot afford to pay the \$85, scholarships are available. Just contact the OLLI office for information.)*

So much discussion on living and health hinges on food and medicine. According to the biblical Creation story, so much more was intended to help human beings live the full life. 5342 Comparative Religious Ethics: A Narrative Approach

Tuesdays, 1-2:25 p.m. (TUC)

The course will endeavor to explain the fundamental laws of physics that underlie our everyday experience and observation. Why is the sky blue and sunsets red? How is a rainbow formed? What makes the refrigerator work? Why does ice float on water? How does a GPS identify locations? Is travel faster than the speed of light possible? Topics of discussion include the physics of light and color, sound and music, meteorology, environmental issues, energy, motion, medical physics, atomic and nuclear phenomena. The presentations will include lecture demonstrations.

Moderator: Professor Henry Fenichel taught at the University of Cincinnati for 38 years prior to his retirement in 2003. Areas of interest in physics include phenomena at extreme low temperatures, optics and holography.

6344 Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky Architecture XVII

Tuesdays, 1-2:25 p.m. (TUC)

In this series of slide-lectures, using historic and contemporary views to examine the rich architectural heritage of Cincinnati and its vicinity, we continue to explore late 19th- and early 20th-century developments now called "The Gilded Age" or "American Renaissance." In the 1890's monumental Beaux-Arts Classicism and the more domestic American Georgian

or Colonial Revival evolved. Cincinnati "Old Master" architects McLaughlin and the Hannafords produced distinguished late works, adapting to the new fashions, while young firms like Elzner & Anderson, Garber & Woodward, and Tietig & Lee introduced exciting new stylistic approaches and technological innovations, including "skyscrapers."

Moderator: Walter E. Langsam, a Yale-trained architectural historian, has taught at UC for 25 years and gives frequent popular lectures and tours. He wrote *Great Houses of the Queen City* (1997) and contributed to *Architecture in Cincinnati* (2008). His *Biographical Dictionary of Cincinnati Architects, 1788-1940*, is available through the Architectural Foundation of Cincinnati at www.architecturecincy.org.

6345 Pay More / Get Less: U.S. Healthcare at the Crossroads

Tuesdays, 1-2:25 p.m. (TUC)

Healthcare reform emerged as a major political issue during the last few years. Is the US system actually cost effective? What are the historical, political and economic realities of our current system? This course will review the American Healthcare system, how care is delivered, financed and managed, comparative systems and the potential for change.

Moderator: Hirsh J. Cohen is a life fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives and has spent over 45 years in executive positions in hospitals, HMOS and public health. He has consulted and lectured extensively in the US, Canada and the UK.

Tuesdays, 10:35 a.m.-Noon (TUC)

Join us for our annual trip through area restaurants. Six sessions will be held at TUC with the chefs, owners, and managers of restaurants. 6446 Backyard Astronomy I

How and why will certain people and issues appear on the ballot while others are "left out in the cold?" Do we use the Australian ballot? Do people or political parties govern in the United States? Why do we elect some but not all judges to serve in office? We will compare the United States history of voting and the electoral process to other modern countries. Civilized discussion will prevail.

Moderator: Mary-Pat Hester, MA in Political Science. Taught at City University of New York during the 1980's. Moved to Cincinnati in 2007 after working in NYC for more than 20 years in periodical publishing.

6512 Now Hear This

Tuesdays, 9-10:25 a.m. (TUC)

FOUR WEEK COURSE from October 23 to November 13.

This course covers the impact of hearing loss on our personal and social lives, understanding types of hearing loss, evaluation process overview, communication training to

augment the success attained from proper use of hearing aid amplification, improvements in today's technologies for hearing aids and assistive listening devices, and tinnitus (ear and head noises). This course will be conducted on October 23, October 30 and November 6 at TUC. The fourth class on November 13 will be at the Speech-Language Hearing Clinic on UC's Medical Campus for those who would like a complimentary hearing consultation with the instructor and audiology doctoral students.

Moderator: John Greer Clark, PhD, Communication Sciences and Disorders, University of Cincinnati; President, Academy of Rehabilitative Audiology.

6513 People in Poetry: Loving, Living, Changing, Dying

Tuesdays, 9-10:25 a.m. (TUC)

Gain insight into your own life as you reflect upon universal experiences of memorable characters created by Shakespeare, E. A. Robinson, Frost, Dunbar, Angelou and Billy Collins. Falling in love? Letting go of loved ones? Feeling jealous or disillusioned, protective or betrayed? Facing changes in yourself or society? Encountering prejudice, war, loss, declining health or death? How have great poets portrayed people facing such challenges? Poems will be read and interpreted in class and then related to our lives and society. Although focus is on people and themes, discussion will include poetic technique- HOW the poem means.

Moderator: Kathy Richardson taught English and History and served as an administrator at Seven Hills School for 42 years. She also taught in Wuhan, China in 1982 and now teaches ESL to Chinese exchange teachers through Cincinnati-Liuzhou Sister Cities.

6541 Art of Our Time - Modern and Contemporary

Tuesdays, 9-10:25 a.m. (TUC)

Beginning with the origins of Modernism, this sixteen week (8 in the Fall Quarter, 8 in the Spring Quarter) class participation course will examine the important visual arts and artists of the 20th and 21st centuries. We will discuss Fauvism, Cubism, Surrealism, Abstract Expressionism and Pop during the first 8 weeks followed by Minimalism, Conceptual Art, Video and Digital Art and the most avant-garde expressions during the second 8-week period. 8155 The High Cost of Bipartisanship

1 DAY COURSE on October 3.

If bipartisanship is such a good idea or even necessary when government is divided, why don't we have more of it? In this WOW, we will explore psychological and political factors that foster partisanship and deter bipartisanship. We will put today's situation in historical context. Finally, we will evaluate pathways to greater cooperation in governing. These include electoral and Congressional reforms and new ways of thinking about conflict and policy.

Co-Moderators: Nancy Lippincott, PhD, U. of Washington, with a concentration in developmental psychology. She taught at Miami U. and has led workshops on social and personal development. Jonathan Lippincott, MLitt, Oxford, and BA, Yale, both degrees in political science. He spent his career in management at the Health Alliance of Greater Cincinnati and before that at the UC Academic Health Center.

As seniors, we need to be very much aware of common areas of risk in personal security matters in the home, in the workplace and in the community. 8157 "It's the Economy, Stupid!"

Wednesday, 9 a.m.-Noon (SSC)

1 DAY COURSE on October 17.

At a heated moment in the 1982 Presidential campaign, James Carville, one of three top aides to presidential candidate Bill Clinton, tried to focus the campaign message and motivate the troops by proclaiming, "It's the economy,

stupid." Clinton's challenge to incumbent George H. W. Bush was staggering at the time and, by Carville's account, unfocused. Mr. Carville's quote and his "good ol' boy" style earned him a place in presidential campaign lore (and a lot of consulting money!). The question is whether the 2012 Presidential Campaign comes down to "the economy, stupid." What about "Obamacare," Syria, Iran, same-sex marriage, relaxation of immigration regulations and "offshoring" jobs? Is the Obama v. Romney campaign a re-match of "It's the economy, stupid"? How do campaign strategists determine the most effective message(s)? By the end June, Super PACs reportedly spent more than \$128 million. If Mr. Carville is correct, why aren't we seeing much more about the economy every time we turn on the TV?

Co-Moderators: Dr. Eric Rademacher is Co-Director of the Institute for Policy Research at the U. of Cincinnati. He also serves as Co-Director of The Ohio Poll. In his role as Co-Director (Public Polling) of the Ohio Poll, Rademacher regularly presents analyses of Ohio Poll results to Ohio's citizens, state policymakers and the state and national media. Dr. Gene Beaupre is the Director for Government Relations and a member of the Philosophy, Politics & the Public Honors Program faculty at Xavier U.

8158 Cincinnati Authors in the Past and Present

1 DAY COURSE on October 24.

Local authors in the Cincinnati area - who were they in the past, and what did they write? Who are they now, and what are they writing today? Two well-qualified authorities will

From Jefferson Avenue, turn onto Corry Blvd.


- Turn left into Corry Garage.
